Clinton County's "Building Better Birders Cruises" "Ding" Darling Environmental Education Award

Puttin' along the backwaters of the Upper Mississippi for the last three years you could find a pontoon with people pointing excitedly at what seemed to be trees. Why was this pontoon crew so excited about trees? Well, they weren't looking at the trees, but the awesome birds perching on the trees! Kelly J. McKay, from Bio Research and Monitoring Center, has teamed up with Mark Roberts and Chuck Jacobsen from Clinton County Conservation to create a free program called, "Building Better Birder Cruises." This program has been a huge success, having four summer tours during the breeding season and four tours during the fall migration. Despite the horrible flooding in 2019 along the Mississippi, they still had 58 people attend these two and a half to four-hour programs and found a whopping 120 bird species! They

found 15 species of waterfowl and other water birds, eight species of raptors, five shorebirds and seven woodpecker species! After finding such cool birds on the tours, there were several participants that became active citizen scientists and helped with Christmas Bird Counts and even the Nahant Marsh BioBlitz Project. Kelly J. McKay for "Outstanding Iowa Volunteer Award"

The "2019 Outstanding Iowa Volunteer Award" goes to Kelly J. McKay. Besides being the lead birder for Clinton County's "Building Better Birder Cruises," Kelly has volunteered for numerous other organizations such as Nahant Marsh, Big Sand Mound, the Audubon Society and several other wildlife advocacy groups. For several years Kelly has participated in all 23 days of the Audubon Society's annual Christmas Bird Counts. He spent 10 plus hours birding and then traversed the countryside from southern Illinois to northern Wisconsin to get to the next bird count location, even in Chicago on Christmas Day!

Kelly is a member of an advisory board for a very special place called Big Sand Mound Preserve, south of Muscatine, Iowa. This 510-acre paradise has sand prairies, wetlands and woodlands that over 400 species call home. Unique and rare organisms, such as the prickly pear cactus, yellow mud turtles and eastern hognose snakes! Kelly helps preserve all these plants and animals for future generations so hopefully they will be able to see animals such as yellow mud turtles and the federally listed Kirtland's Warbler. Speaking of which, Kelly found an immature female Kirtland's Warbler at the Soaring Eagle Nature Center last fall during the CCCB's annual "Hawk Watch", which is the first ever state record for Iowa! Congratulations Kelly on your spectacular find! May all your hard work and willingness to share your knowledge inspire the next generation.



These awards, along with many others, are awarded each year by the *Iowa Association of Naturalists* and *Iowa Conservation Education Coalition*. The Long and Winding Road...

In earlier issues of "The Heron", I wrote articles looking back into my own history with Clinton County Conservation. I have decided to make a series of my top eleven "Greatest Hits".

6. Disc Golf Courses ~ When I was attending the University of Northern Iowa, back in the mid-eighties, I was introduced to a new sport, disc golf. The premise was simple, play just like regular golf except you throw a disc (frisbee) at a basket. The actual skills of throwing a disc with curves, playing the wind and snaking through trees takes years to master. Come to think of it, I still haven't mastered any of it!

I was allured by the game because it was outside and free to play. All you needed was a golf disc or frisbee! There were no lines and no tee times. I continued to play through the 90's at courses in Fort Dodge, Cedar Rapids and the Quad Cities. They were few and far between back then.

In 1992, when I began my career in Clinton County, I started to think about how a course could be established here. To do that, I had to persuade the staff and Board members who never heard of the sport and couldn't imagine people playing it, that it was a worthwhile venture.

I convinced them that Folletts Park, a 7-acre, underutilized area right on US 67, would be perfect. It is an 18-hole course with nine baskets that are played twice from different approach angles. A league was started to introduce the public to the sport, while selling discs at the nearby and popular Rock Creek Campground. Finally, disc golf was off and running in Clinton County by 2001.

During league, I even played against Disc Golf Hall of Famer, Des Reading, as her grandparents are from Wheatland. She was introduced to disc golf at the same park I played at while at UNI. She dominated the Women's World Championships between 2002-2010 with golds in 2002, 2005 & 2006. Oh yeah, she whooped me!

From that first league, brand new enthusiasts emerged that were instrumental in installing courses in Fulton, Clinton and Dewitt. I then turned my sights to Malone Park for a 12-hole course that plays around the lake to the west boundary and back; and recently, a 9-hole course at Walnut Grove Park and a three hole "free-style" course at Eden Valley Refuge. I am proud of my role in bringing the sport of disc golf to Clinton County! To learn to play attend a

7. Prairies for Schools ~ Since 1995, the Clinton County Chapter of Pheasants Forever and the CCCB have cooperated on this unique program. While working with area students, we were disappointed to discover that very few children had any concept of a prairie.

The first step is to answer the question, "What is a prairie?" We wanted children to know that prairies are a dynamic ecosystem consisting of grasses, flowers and animals. Prairies are a part of Iowa's past, present and future. The past, statistics of prairie disappearance, land use change and associated wildlife loss. The present, our rich farmland created by the prairie. The future, which we feel is most important, is that prairies are restorable and we can bring it back!

A visit to a prairie remnant reinforces that a prairie is a relic of the past, pieces that are locked away like a museum specimen of an extinct animal. The idea was that if children had a piece of prairie on their school grounds, they would have a much better idea of what a prairie is. Playing in it, seeing creatures and plants living in it, would make it real. Hopefully, transforming the prairie into something in our present, something that can be restored for our future, something not alien, but familiar.

In 2001, the *Iowa Association of Naturalists* and the *Iowa Conservation Education Council* presented *Clinton County Chapter of Pheasants Forever* and *Clinton County Conservation* with the "Ada Hayden Conservation Education Award" for the "Prairies for Schools Project." We also received national recognition in a feature article in the *Pheasants Forever National Journal*. This program was named one of the "Top 25 Pioneering Habitat Projects of All-Time" by Pheasants Forever in 2007.

Since 1993, the program has established 20 prairies on schools plus daycare centers, colleges and nature center lands. Many are gone because the schools are gone, many still remain and both organizations are open to establishing new projects on school lands.

News from the East District

I hope this newsletter finds everyone safe and healthy. It has been a roller coaster for Clinton County Conservation. We have had parks, restrooms, cabins, playgrounds and the Eco Tourism Center open then closed and then open again over the course of the Covid-19 pandemic. We are doing our best to get people outside, enjoying our facilities while staying within the rapidly changing parameters set by the state and county.

Our utmost concern is to keep everyone safe and healthy during these times of uncertainty. We are hopeful for a normal camping season in the coming weeks and months, both from a Covid-19 and flooding stand-point.



Before the pandemic hit the state, we were working on clearing hazard trees in the park. It looked like a war zone with the drab of winter, ruts in the ground from machinery, leftover branches and unsightly stumps. It caught the eye of the people that drove through the park and we were asked, "what happened to all the trees?!" These trees

were identified with problems that could pose a risk to our visitors. If any trees are unsafe for any reason, they need to be removed or in some cases, just the limbs need to be trimmed. There were many trees that showed signs of rot or hollow areas near the base of the tree. These trees are more susceptible of falling over during high winds, so they were removed as well.

With extended periods of high river levels the last several years, the trees experienced high stress to where they could not survive. Although many species of trees are adapted to changing water levels, last season we had record high water for a record amount of time and trees cannot tolerate that. Their roots need air! Once these trees die they are campground hazards and we must remove them.

With 130 trees down and 130 stumps leftover, ranging from 6"- 48", we have invested in a new stump grinder to help maintain our parks. Although we do not like to remove trees, it is a necessity at times and provides benefits. It will allow others around them to be healthier by having less competition for nutrients and sunlight. Opening the canopy will allow more sunlight and hopefully a better lawn as we struggle to grow grass in the heavy shaded areas.

As the Mississippi River Eco Tourism Center sat empty, we have been able to work on some building improvements that our visitors are going to love. The first project was in the works in late 2019. By generous donations of two *Friends of Rock Creek* members, an unexpected bathroom remodel was started. Dave Willis contributed the ideas and funds to get the project started and Matt Loper donated his time, expertise and funds to finish it. The Eco Center now has a beautiful green, hard surface counter with integrated sinks! Also installed are soap dispensers with pleasant smelling soap. Then to top it off, hands free door openers!

The second project is changing up the small classroom. This room has seen a variety of themes, from snakes to prairies, allowing different experiences for visitors. It is important to us for the room to have hands-on activities. Right now the room has a fresh coat of paint and constellations on the ceiling but soon it will be filled with nest boxes, eggs, silhouettes and activities for all of you bird nerds out there.



Lastly, maintenance of the Nature Gallery is tough to do with all of the activity this area gets. But with this lull, we have seized the moment to touch up some areas that were seeing some wear. Also, with visitors not visiting the animals, we were able to take all the animals to a different location to put a layer of sealant on their enclosures to ensure continued easy cleaning in the future.

Now, more than ever, nature is providing us a place to play, feel safe and to enjoy the summer months! **We invite you to consider a family summer camp with a CCB Naturalist.** We have adapted our summer camp programs to allow families to spend a day with a Naturalist experiencing camp-like activities all while practicing social distancing guidelines and best health practices. Immediate families with 9 or less people can sign up for a one-day (4 hr.) camp at one of our county parks. To do this, you need to contact a naturalist to schedule a date, location and plan your activities for your camp. Cost for the family camp is \$50 and will be paid at the time of the camp.
