A Quiet Place to Rest

ust like how people are different from each other, all the areas managed by the Clinton County Conservation board have their own differences and unique personalities, if you will. Some are more social with lots of visitors interacting with each other, while others tend to be quieter and calmer. One little-known area that offers a great chance to find some peace and reconnect with nature is Sherman Park.

Sherman Park is nestled in the southwest corner of Clinton County, right



along the Wapsipinicon River. It is about a 30-minute drive from Davenport, and about 15 minutes west of DeWitt.

The Park has several interesting and unique features. It offers trails, public access to the Wapsi River, camping and public hunting. For camping, it offers both electric and primitive camping. All sites offer a fire pit and a picnic table. Primitive sites are located along the Wapsi and offer riverfront views, and you can fish right from your site. The downside to this being that the sites are subject to flooding when the river is high. The electric sites are located on the upper side of the campground and are situated quietly in the timber. There is a playground, picnic shelter, and shower house located nearby. All sites are available on a first come-first serve basis, apart from an accessible site that is available for online reservation by those with special requirements.

The park also offers public hunting throughout most of the area. Much of the park is forested, with small open areas patched in. This offers great opportunities

onstantly attached to mobile devices, endless scrolling on social media, watching news feeds, checking texts, gaming, etc.; today's world seems to have accelerated to say the least in terms of our connection to technology. I feel many of us have lost our connection to the natural world around us. That said, breaking away from these routines by getting outside to exercise or just to ground ourselves can benefit us both physically and mentally. Whether it is for 15 minutes or several hours a day, it has been scientifically proven that time outdoors decreases stress, anxiety, depression, and obesity. It can lower cortisol and blood pressure, improve cardiovascular health, boost serotonin (a happy chemical in the body), replenish vitamin D (enhancing immune function), and create an overall sense of well-being and enlightenment in our lives.

I think we could all agree, physical activities are the most beneficial for our mind and body. However, just being mindful of our natural surroundings has a tremendous impact on our mental health. Connecting with nature by using our five senses helps us tune in

and focus on the immediate environment which we are in. There is a method utilizing the five senses (sight, touch, sound, smell, and taste) that helps us connect to our environment, this is called the "5-4-3-2-1 Grounding Method." Whether you are out on a hike in a remote area or just stepping outside your back door, you can practice this technique.

"5-4-3-2-1 Grounding Method"

- Visually observe 5 things, notice their shape, color and fine details.
- Grab 4 different objects to touch, sensing the different textures, temperatures and how they feel next to your skin. This could be as basic as a subtle breeze.
- Listen to 3 different sounds, near and far.
- Take a deep breath and try to find 2 things you can smell.
- Recognize 1 thing you can taste, this is more so a lingering taste in your mouth from a food or beverage you may be enjoying while you ground (it is not advised to ingest anything outdoors unless properly identified).

One of my favorite places to reconnect with nature, aside from my own backyard, is Eden Valley Refuge. Located just south of Baldwin, this park has plenty of space to ground, reconnect, and get a good workout in!

Nature enthusiasts can enjoy beauty here, year-round in this 200-acre park while doing just that. It is a host for beautiful spring ephemeral flowers, summer pollinating prairies (native grasses and flowers), migrating and resident birds (over 100 total bird species observed this year), forest flora and fauna, and aquatic life.







There are nearly five miles of scenic hiking trails that wind through the woods blanketing limestone bluffs and outcrops, meandering Bear Creek, and popping into petite prairie areas found within the refuge. The trail system is easy to navigate, depending on skill level. While on a hike, you can visit the "main attractions" the favorite features of the park, which include the popular swinging bridge, the lookout tower and Wulf's Den- a shallow cavern inside the bluff along the trail that once had the original owner, Arnold Wulf's cabin attached to it. Stone face is another park feature that is hidden within the forest and can be challenging to find. This unique boulder resembles the profile of a human face and is located high on a bluff just before the fork in the trail that leads you to either the swinging bridge or lookout tower.

If you are an ambitious hiker and a puzzle lover, you are invited to play Eden Valley's Treasure Quest! A riddle/hands-on game that starts at the parking lot on the NW side of Bear Creek, here you will find the first treasure quest box and a clue. It will guide you to the next box, so on and so forth, journeying through the park until you have reached box six and get to collect your prize!

With so much to do, Eden Valley is a spectacular place to spend the weekend! To really soak it all in, consider renting the Bunkhouse cabin located along the trail or one of the camping cabins located next to the nature center. It also offers plenty of modern and primitive campsites. Close to camp they have many things to do including a basketball hoop, playground, and disc golf! Test your disc throwing skills here with no worries as this is not a championship course by any means! It is an open/free style course with 3 "holes" or baskets. I like to play one way through then turn around and play backwards, it can easily be a 3-, 6-, or 9-hole course if you repeat that method and you can set the par as you wish.

Although it is a great place to visit year-round, one of my favorite seasons of the year to visit Eden Valley is quickly approaching, and that's autumn! The trees will be changing colors, losing leaves, and opening the scenery that is hidden below the canopy. Take a trip there this fall and see for yourself! As you go and enjoy, here are a few outdoor principles I live by and would like to share with you before your journey: Leave NO Trace, Know Before You Go, Take Only Photographs, Respect Wildlife, and Be Considerate of Others!

for hunting deer, turkey, and squirrel. There are occasional pheasants and wood ducks, but not in numbers sufficient to target. Other animals that frequent the area include raccoons, opossums, coyotes, foxes, and the occasional bobcat. There are also many species of birds. Eagles frequent the riverfront, and Indigo Buntings and Orioles are a common sight in the primitive camping area. American woodcocks are also a commonly seen in the park, particularly in the spring. Each spring, the naturalists with the Conservation Board will host a "Woodcock Dance" in the park, where the public can witness the unique courtship of woodcocks in their natural habitat.

We are always looking at ways we can improve the park. For the 2025 camping season, we added free internet service to the campground. This addition was well worth it, especially considering cell service along the Wapsi can be questionable, depending on your provider. Now, campers and visitors are able to stay connected while enjoying the outdoors. In 2024 we also added the option for an online registration method, allowing for campers to register easily online.

Due to the location and size of the park, Sherman Park can be a great spot to get away from everyone and everything else. You may have to deal with the gravel roads but, if you are looking for a quiet spot to rest, it can be found.

his summer Clinton County Conservation teamed up with Jackson and Dubuque County naturalists to lead a backpacking trip for local youth. We made the trek 2.5 hours away to Sand Ridge State Forest near Forest City, Illinois. This is the largest state forest in Illinois, spanning 7,550 acres, and it is a natural oasis in a desert of agricultural fields. This forest is very unique in the fact that it has a component of native oaks and hickories, but it also contains an expansive pine plantation. The purpose of the pine plantations were to prove that you could sustainably grow and harvest pine trees without irrigation. This was especially important due to the forest having extremely sandy soils! Due to the sandy soils, Sand Ridge State Forest contains a very unique habitat that also occurs here in Iowa, sand prairies! These sand prairies and dense forests not only had unique plant life, but also interesting and uncommon animal life. The forest is home to Prickly Pear Cactus, Reindeer Moss, Plains Hognose Snakes, Six-linned Racerunners, Fowler's Toads and one of the largest breeding populations of Eastern Whippoor-wills! Being able to catch a glimpse of just a few of these interesting plants and animals was certainly a highlight!

On our first day we gathered our gear, put on our heavy packs, and hit the trail! We hiked around 3 miles into our first camp site. We walked up sandy

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hills, through the pine forests and had a few wild strawberry snacks along the way. Once we got to camp the kids were eager to show off their fire building skills, even though it was over 80 degrees outside! The night consisted of learning how to use portable camping stoves, munching on our freeze-dried meals, drinking our "sasquatch soup" and learning how to hang a bear bag. As the night continued, the forest was filled with laughter and the sounds of owls and Whip-poor-wills.

The next morning came and it was time to head out on our longest trek of the trip. On the second day we hiked around 8 miles to reach our final resting spot in the forest. On our journey we took lots of breaks in the shade, played games at lunch and saw fields filled with blooming Prickly Pear Cactus. Unlike the previous night, the long hike wore the kids out and the camp and fire took a little longer to set up. Many games were played, scary stories were shared and even a hike to an open prairie to see the strawberry moon filled our final night.

On our final morning, we had a short 1-mile hike to our air-condi-

tioned cars, but our journey was not over just yet. We had the opportunity to tour Illinois largest of three hatcheries, the Jake Wolf Memorial Fish Hatchery. They were currently raising Northern Pike and Muskellunge that we got to see and we learned about the process that the fish go through from egg to release. This hatchery is currently the only state facility in Illinois that rears and stocks salmon and trout into Lake Michigan. At peak fish production, the hatchery can produce over 30 million fish!

This trip was my first of hopefully many backpacking trips with youth. It was amazing to see them break out of their shells and make friends with total strangers. Not only was it a mentally challenging trip, being away from family, friends and most importantly their phones, but the physical challenge was a whole other beast. Our trip was filled with very hot, sunny days in a park with no natural water sources and the occasional sand dune we had (or more accurately, got to) walk up. I am so proud of each and every one of the kids that went on this trip, they followed Leave No Trace principals,

helped one another around camp and made us all laugh. It isn't always about giving formal programs about animals or the importance of protecting habitats, sometimes it is just about getting out in nature and seeing it for yourself. Seeing and being immersed in a wild habitat can do wonders for you.

Spending time outdoors is growing in importance as our screen time increases, especially for our youth. Studies have shown that spending time outdoors can reduce stress and anxiety, improve mood and enhance cognitive functions. Along with mental wellbeing, hiking helps reduce your risk of chronic diseases such as heart disease, type 2 diabetes and can lower blood pressure and heart rates. Being in the sun helps your body absorb Vitamin D too! It doesn't have to be a 3-day 2-night backpacking trip in a forest, it can be as simple as reading a book outside, taking a walk around the block or going fishing. However you choose to spend your time outside, just know that it will have lasting benefits to both your mental and physical health.

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
